This is a perfect chance for the youth in your unit to make money, earn prizes, and provide some great discount coupons for their family and friends.



Some Thoughts about New Boys and



Summer Camp

Some tips for Scoutmasters and Parents:

- Get the camping equipment list to the parents and a copy to the scout as soon as they crossover or join.
 Many items are on sale before the season starts.
- Give a list of things that must be brought to camp and items to leave behind
- Make sure that the scout and the parents label all items in the Scout's possession with a troop number and name, even both socks. Take a black laundry marker to mark items that were

forgotten. If the boys get camp t-shirts, be sure to mark them

- Those older scouts will be your best resource for helping out the younger boys. Have the older boys in the troop talk to the younger ones and tell them about camp and how much fun it is. Show pictures of the scouts in your troop at the last summer camp, and have the boys have a "Remember when..." session.
 Be sure to tell the leadership in the troop to avoid the horror stories about camp unless they are funny and do not put down another scout. The older boys should invite the younger ones and let the new scouts know that they will have a friend in camp. They can even tell about how they really
- missed home, but they were glad that they stayed.
 If your troop has a competition or game that is played at camp, play the game or prepare for the competition in a troop meeting soon after the new boys have joined, but long before they go to camp. If there is something familiar to look forward to, they will look at camp very positively.
- Tell the younger scouts to bring a board game for the scouts to
 play at night before going to bed. It increases camaraderie and
 keeps the scouts busy. Anticipation will help make the scout
 positive.
- Talk to parents frankly, but out of earshot of the boy. Ask if there
 are any problems with homesickness, bedwetting,
 sleepwalking, or behavior disorders that you should know
 about. Work out a plan ahead of time on what the parent and
 troop response will be to the problem if it comes up.
- Consider not having the first-year boys take the "Pathfinder", "New Scout" or similar programs that are advancement oriented, especially if the course takes all day. Encourage the scout to choose fun, outdoor merit badges, such as swimming, archery, boating, and outdoor cooking for their first year at camp. Leave time for free swimming in the afternoon. Have them avoid merit badge classes that are too much like school, with lots of listening and writing.

Camp is *in* the outdoors, so make it *fun* in the outdoors. A small amount of preparation and a large amount of communication will help the new scout have a great time at summer camp.

Youth Protection Issues: Urgent Information to be shared

Recent events in our council regarding the sexual exploitation of a Scout by a trusted volunteer have increased the urgency of educating our parents and youth about the Youth Protection Policies of the BSA.

In addition, the burgeoning use of electronic communication such as cell-phones and text-messaging/photo sharing has created a new wrinkle and loophole that can be exploited by possible abusers to your child and the youth in your program. Technology has us playing 'catch-up' in many ways.

Careful leadership selection through background checks, letters of recommendation, and reputation are simply not enough. However, the barriers that BSA erects are 5-fold, with careful leadership selection being only one of them. The good news is that if all BSA policies are followed and known by the unit and the parents, the opportunity for abuse will likely be removed or be made so risky that the perpetrator will not risk involvement.

The solution is to have every adult and youth educated as to what is allowed and what is not allowed in the BSA program. The BSA has it covered in the unit and youth-appropriate Youth Protection Training (YPT) videos, online and in-person training, and in the Guide to Safe Scouting and other documents (available for free online).

So how will you protect yourself and your adult leaders from false accusation, your child from exploitation, and the unit from scandal and humiliation, and yet still give the everimportant adult contact and role-modeling that is so important to our program?

Some items that you should be aware of:

- 1) Recent changes in the **Boy Scout Requirements** (January 2008) include information about bullying and Internet abuse by cyber bullies and others.
- 2) New Youth Protection videos (that supplement the Youth Protection Training available online and through your training teams) are now available on DVD for both adults and youth in all sections (Cubs, Scouts, and Venturing) and will be available for free at Roundtable for all units and interested persons. (VHS versions may also be available upon request). The training team is always available to help you with presentations or to answer questions.
- 3) **Electronic threats** to your child's personal, physical, and mental well-being should be identified and discussed by your unit committee and the adults in your unit. Roundtable and the training team will have information about ways that Scouters, parents, and youth can safely use the Internet, text messaging and other electronic communications that proliferate in our culture.

Scout Roundtable and the *Up Etowah Creek* Newsletter will also have information on ways that parents can find out if their child is being abused/bullied by others or is abusing others, behavioral tell-

tales to watch for, how to track usage of cell phones and Internet site visits, establish security barriers for communication devices (computers, cell phones, PDAs, etc) and more.

4) Safety in Traveling: Know how and <u>when</u> to properly file a Tour Permit, know what the council has on updates on Tour Permits, and upcoming changes in the filing of Tour Permits (there is the possibility of online filing in the future).

What Every Unit Should Be Stressing:

Youth Protection Training is important for <u>all</u> members of the unit, adults and youth alike. **Get your unit trained**, in person or online. And if your unit leaders say that you do not need to be trained, they are wrong. Protect yourself and your children by knowing and enacting the policies and procedures of the BSA.

- ALL youth must be told that one-on-one contact of any sort (in person or electronically) with an adult who is not their parent is not allowed in the BSA, and what they should do if it happens.
- ALL youth need to be encouraged to watch out for each other and be made aware that bullying and/or harassment is not tolerated in the BSA, from adults or from youth.
- ALL parents must be educated so that they know what the rules are and what to look for: for example, that if a leader brings their child home from a meeting, there must be another child (the leader's son for example) or 2 adults in the car with them
- ALL parents, youth, leaders, and volunteers need to know what to do and who to contact if suspicions are raised.

All Youth Protection Videos are available for free in DVD and/or VHS format from the Scout Shop, your training team, or your Unit Commissioner. Training materials, helps, and guides and a complete list of available publications are also available online at http://scouting.org/pubs/yp/index.html

Online Youth Protection Training is available for all levels through the council website at www.indianwaters.org. Create an account and be sure to print off the final page when the training is completed, so that you will get credit through your unit (pack, troop, or crew) for being currently trained. The next in-person Youth Protection Training will take place on February 26 at 7:00 pm at Faith Presbyterian Church. Register online through the council website. Cost is \$3: pre-register and pay at the Scout Shop, or on-line by February 22, 2008.
