

Eagle Application News:

Changes for 2008



The new printing of the Eagle Scout Rank Application, No. 58-728, has a notable change. Now, under Requirement 5, the name of the candidate's Eagle project is required, as well as the grand total of hours devoted to it (from page 10 of the Eagle Scout Leadership Project Workbook). The new application will be required beginning May 1, 2008.

Unit Advancement RecordsSome Tips and Hints for Troops

Two things are almost guaranteed in the life of a Scouter.

- 1) Murphy was an optimist!
- 2) No matter what method(s) you use (computer or manual), records will be lost or messed up sometime during a Scout's career.

Be Prepared:

1) Encourage Scouts to take good care of their books (cases are cheap), and check during every Scoutmaster conference that they have their name in the book and that all things are properly initialed and dated. A completed book will be sufficient proof for all non merit badge related requirements if there is a discrepancy when doing Eagle Paperwork. Note: the name checking trick is also a good way to help your memory along when you have problems remembering the names of the 20 crossovers.



- 2) Troops handle blue-cards differently, so explain to the boys that they really need to hold on to their portion or at least a copy of their blue cards. Again, this will be more than enough proof if there is a discrepancy.
- 3) Have Troop Merit Badge Counselors turn in all their blue-cards or copies to the troop for consistent, safe, and organized (hopefully) archives.
- 4) After a Scout reaches Star, encourage parents to call the

Council Office to get a copy of their boy's official record. Review it! Fixing issues is easier closer to the event. This should be done again after they reach Life. Encourage them to keep those reports!

- 5) If a Scout transfers from another council, get a copy of that official record from the old council, and make sure it is transferred properly. Have the Scout or parents keep that record safe.
- 4) Use an automated manner of tracking advancement (TroopMaster, Internet only, etc., whatever works) but remember, **things do go wrong**. However, the Council office will always work with you if you have a good paper trail, even if the "official process" broke down. They always favor the scouts in these sorts of situations.
- 5) The automated systems can help make sure your dates balance, but they are not infallible. There have been cases where MBs were not allocated properly and the Scout had to postpone moving forward as a result. For your sanity, check the reports.

6) Don't forget to have fun with all of this!

Make your own FREE professional You-tube Music Video using your pictures from Scouting

Animoto.com



Animoto.com is a web application that creates MTV-style videos with the click of a button. Users simply choose a song and images. Animoto then automatically generates a unique video for them. No two videos are ever the same. Many of the post-production techniques that the founders used while working as producers for MTV, Comedy Central & ABC are used in Animoto's patent-pending Cinematic Artificial Intelligence developed to think like an actual editor and director. The resulting video is produced in a widescreen format, containing the visual energy of a music video and the emotional impact of a movie trailer.

Animoto.com is a website that takes your pictures and turns them into a music video. Created by a bunch of former TV producers, the concept behind Animoto is that you upload images to the site, either from your computer, or online photo sites, such as Flickr, Facebook, or Photobucket, pick a song to go along with it, and Animoto will automatically create a cool video for you. Animoto is definitely a slick, fun, easy way to compile your photos into energetic videos. After Animoto analyzes, produces, and creates your video, you can tweak it by adding or deleting images, or changing up the soundtrack. Free for 30 seconds of video per session and with unlimited session, you can then download your music video, post it on your website or blog or send to YouTube.

Use the videos to celebrate a special Scouting award, a Court of Honor, a camping trip, and more. How would your troop like to have a canoeing music video on Facebook or your crew use a high-energy rock climbing trip to recruit new members? And for those crossover Webelos, a "Goodbye to the Pack" video will be worth saving! This is a great site and well worth visiting.

Lost and Found? Not likely!

We are all carrying around one or more thumb drives (portable USB flash-drives). I carry my Roundtable Powerpoints, pictures, songs, and more. It looks like all of the other ones out there, and is easy to misplace or run through the washer. And what about my digital camera and the memory card that is on it with all of my pictures from the Court of Honor, Johnny tying his first knot, and the sunset at Philmont? If I set it down, someone could steal it. Or it could fall out of my pocket, or be left on a bus. How will I ever have a chance of getting it back?



Here are some tips that apply to both gadgets.

Use the extra address labels that you get in the mail and put one on your gadget. Cover it with clear tape to make it stick well.

If you are using a Flash Drive, **remember to back it up**, because you can lose it. Download the info to your computer and a stand-alone portable hard drive, or upload it to a web-based server. And while you

are at it, save it to a DVD and send a copy to your friends. That way if your house burns down, you will have a chance of seeing that info again

And while backing up is a good idea, recovery is better. Because they are so portable, what happens if you lose it or leave it stuck in the computer at the library? Is your name, address, phone number on it? How are you going to prove it is yours or get it back if you leave?

If an honest person finds your flash drive, you have a chance to get it back if you follow this suggestion:
Whenever I get a new flash device or memory card, I always store a plain text file on the root folder with the file name !Owner-Info.txt.

I create it with *Notepad* and **list my name**, **e-mail address**, **and phone number** along with a statement requesting anyone who finds it to contact me. I repeat the information in the file in French, German, and Spanish using Babelfish (babelfish.altavista.com) and save it on my desktop as a **Read Only** text file [right-click on Properties, then check the box that says Read Only] so I can't mistakenly erase it. The exclamation point (!) in the file name makes the file appears at the top of the list when someone views the files. The plain text format (.txt) lets the file be read on any computer.

Of course, all this assumes that your lost device is found by an honest person. But, even if it was stolen, an honest person may end up with it before long. Also, you might recover a flash card but not the device it was in, but that's better than nothing. So now whenever I get a jump drive or digital camera memory card, I put this in the main directory of the flash drive or memory card. And my first picture on my camera is of my business card. So perhaps one day, if I lose the camera, it may make it's way back to me. (Adapted from www.windowssecrets.com)

Recent events in our council regarding the sexual exploitation of a Scout by a trusted volunteer have increased the urgency of educating our parents and youth about the Youth Protection Policies of the BSA.

In addition, the burgeoning use of electronic communication such as cell-phones and text-messaging/photo sharing has created a new wrinkle and loophole that can be exploited by possible abusers to your child and the youth in your program. Technology has us playing 'catch-up' in many ways.

Careful leadership selection through background checks, letters of recommendation, and reputation are simply not enough. However, the barriers that BSA erects are 5-fold, with careful leadership selection being only one of them. The good news is that if all BSA policies are followed and known by the unit and the parents, the opportunity for abuse will likely be removed or be made so risky that the perpetrator will not risk involvement.

The solution is to have every adult and youth educated as to what is allowed and what is not allowed in the BSA program. The BSA has it covered in the unit and youth-appropriate Youth Protection Training (YPT) videos, online and in-person training, and in the Guide to Safe Scouting and other documents (available for free online).

So how will you protect yourself and your adult leaders from false accusation, your child from exploitation, and the unit from scandal and humiliation, and yet still give the ever-important adult contact and role-modeling that is so important to our program?

Some items that you should be aware of:

- 1) Recent changes in the **Boy Scout Requirements** (January 2008) include information about bullying and Internet abuse by cyber bullies and others.
- 2) New Youth Protection videos (that supplement the Youth Protection Training available online and through your training teams) are now available on DVD for both adults and youth in all sections (Cubs, Scouts, and Venturing) and will be available for free at Roundtable for all units and interested persons. (VHS versions may also be available upon request). The training team is always available to help you with presentations or to answer questions.
- 3) **Electronic threats** to your child's personal, physical, and mental well-being should be identified and discussed by your unit committee and the adults in your unit. Roundtable and the training team will have information about ways that Scouters, parents, and youth can safely use the Internet, text messaging and other electronic communications that proliferate in our culture.

Scout Roundtable and the *Up Etowah Creek* Newsletter will also have information on ways that parents can find out if their child is being abused/bullied by others or is abusing others, behavioral tell-tales to watch for, how to track usage of cell phones and Internet site visits, establish security barriers for communication devices (computers, cell phones, PDAs, etc) and more.

4) Safety in Traveling: Know how and <u>when</u> to properly file a Tour Permit, know what the council has on updates on rules regarding Tour Permits, and upcoming changes in the filing of Tour Permits (there is the possibility of online filing in the future).

What Every Unit Should Be Stressing:

Youth Protection Training is important for <u>all</u> members of the unit, adults and youth alike. **Get your unit trained**, in person or online. *And if your unit leaders say that you do not need to be trained, they are wrong.* Protect yourself and your children by knowing and enacting the policies and procedures of the BSA.

- ALL youth must be told that one-on-one contact of any sort (in person or electronically) with an adult who is not their parent is not allowed in the BSA, and what they should do if it happens.
- * ALL youth need to be encouraged to watch out for each other and be made aware that bullying, jazzing, and/or harassment is not tolerated in the BSA, not from adults and not from youth.
- * ALL parents must be educated so that they know what the rules are and what to look for: for example, that if a leader brings their child home from a meeting, there must be another child (the leader's son for example) or 2 adults in the car with them
- * ALL parents, youth, leaders, and volunteers need to know what to do and who to contact if suspicions are raised.

The BSA Youth Protection Policy is not just to protect the youth; it is also to protect the leaders from unfounded rumors, allegations, or suspicion. Lives, reputations, families, and units have been ruined by innuendo and false accusations. By following the policies, knowing the rules, and understanding reason for them, your unit will be a Safe Haven for your son and the sons of your Scouting friends.

All Youth Protection Videos are available for free in DVD and/or VHS format from the Scout Shop, your training team, or your Unit Commissioner. Training materials, helps, and guides and a complete list of available publications are also available online at http://scouting.org/pubs/yp/index.html

Online Youth Protection Training is available for all levels through the council website at www.indianwaters.org. Create an account and be sure to print off the final page when the training is completed, so that you will get credit through your unit (pack, troop, or crew) for being currently trained.
