Criminal Background Checks for All Leaders to be Completed

To ensure Youth Protection, our organization has conducted criminal background checks (CBC) on all new volunteers since April 2003. Volunteers who have not had a background check will receive a letter in early June from Chief Scout Executive Bob Mazzuca, The letter will direct the volunteer to a website to authorize a CBC (which report criminal activity, not credit or financial history). The site will be active from June 1 until August 1, 2008.

- This applies to adults registered in the BSA prior to April 2003.
- Letters to leaders should be going out in late May/Early June.
- Make sure that your contact addresses are correct for all memberships on your charter.
- If a leader does not have Internet access, please notify the Scout Office once a letter has been received or provide Internet access to him/her
- There is no charge.
- August 1, 2008 is the deadline.
- Volunteers who decline the authorization for a background check will lose their BSA membership.

ages 8 - 17, and an opportunity to go flying in a general aviation airplane. These flights are offered free of charge and are made possible through the generosity of EAA member volunteers



Free Tools of the Month

Free Audio Editing Software Wavosaur www.wavosaur.com

With **podcasting** more popular than ever, more and more people are now looking for easy ways to record, edit, mix, and save sound on their PCs.

In fact, people don't want to simply record only their voices for their **podcasts**. They are now making entire downloadable shows that are edited and mixed to such quality, that they sound almost as good as the pros. Software that can do all this editing has been, historically, very expensive (like the \$349 Adobe Audition) but excellent free products are now available that will give you that professional touch you desire for your recordings. Wavosaur weighs in at a total uncompressed file size of 491K, and requires no installation, making it extremely portable. What surprised me about it was that, for such a small program, Wavosaur packs a lot of advanced features, including resample, bit-depth convert (8,16,24,32 bits), pitch shift, vocal removal, and export of multiple .wav files from regions. Sooner or later you will need to convert an Adobe PDF file

to a Microsoft Word DOC file. They are, after all, two of the most common document file formats around. ZamZar is an excellent general file conversion site, and PDF to DOC is one of the many conversion options available. In a test file that was sent the two column layout was preserved, the images were reproduced in their correct locations and the varying fonts rendered well, given that Word had no exact

matching fonts. Importantly, all the text could be edited from within Word. This free conversion service is useful when you have to convert a PDF to editable Word. Note: if the email link does not work, try copy and pasting it into

the browser. www.zamzar.com

A *favicon* is a small, 16x16 image that is shown inside the browser's location bar and bookmark menu when your site is called up. Easy to use, just find a picture file on your computer (limited to 150kb) and upload. It makes your file into a 16x16 ico file. For nonwebmasters, options include a 32x32 or 48x48 file for your desktop or as an avatar. Instant and Easy!!

The Archery Shoot

I recently got a letter from Kate, a friend of mine in my home town and a Scout Commissioner like me. I want to share it with you all on this last roundtable of the year for me.

"This past weekend, I took a few days of vacation and headed to Northern California on a road trip with my Dad. We spent three days in Redding, CA with extended family for an archery shoot that we all enjoy. Some of the highlights included shooting well enough to beat my uncle, and hiking through beautiful weather without getting sun-burned to a crisp.

A long-time family friend joined our group along with his 11-year old son Michael. Young Michael happens to hold several CA State archery records for his age group, and so I was looking forward to watching him shoot. At every target, he came to the line, focused and ready, noted his yardage, and loosed his two arrows in succession towards various foam critters. Over the three days of the shoot, we shot 150 arrows, and Michael missed the bulls-eye (just barely) only 8 times. By the end of the shoot, he was a mere 8 points from a perfect score of 1,650 points. In comparison, I was pretty happy to only drop an arrow 7 times (to "drop an arrow" means to miss the target completely). I was (considerably) further from a perfect scoreJ

During the 9 hour drive back home that I shared with Dad, I had ample opportunity to consider how Michael's shooting could be applied to Scouting.

He came to the shoot well practiced and well trained. *Are you trained in your current scouting position?*

He always paid close attention to his form- how he loaded the arrow on the bow, how he held the bow, how he aimed and released. *Do you know how to apply your training to your current scouting position?*

He always noticed his target, and noted carefully exactly where to aim. *Do you know your unit goals for the year? Think along the lines of the Centennial Quality Unit program.*

He always noted the distance to the target. *Do you know what your unit needs to do to reach its goals?* "

Many thanks to all the volunteers who make the Scouting program happen in our district. May all of you hit your goals, and help coach our Scouts to hit their goals as well. Please come to Roundtable in the fall and bring a friend. I promise you that it will be worth your time. Thank you for allowing me to share my resources and talents with you all.

Youth Protection Issues: Urgent Information to be shared

Recent events in our council regarding the sexual exploitation of a Scout by a trusted volunteer have increased the urgency of educating our parents and youth about the Youth Protection Policies of the BSA.

In addition, the burgeoning use of electronic communication such as cell-phones and text-messaging/photo sharing has created a new wrinkle and loophole that can be exploited by possible abusers to your child and the youth in your program. Technology has us playing 'catch-up' in many ways.

Careful leadership selection through background checks, letters of recommendation, and reputation are simply not enough. However, the barriers that BSA erects are 5-fold, with careful leadership selection being only one of them. The good news is that if all BSA policies are followed and known by the unit and the parents, the opportunity for abuse will likely be removed or be made so risky that the perpetrator will not risk involvement.

The solution is to have every adult and youth educated as to what is allowed and what is not allowed in the BSA program. The BSA has it covered in the unit and youth-appropriate Youth Protection Training (YPT) videos, online and in-person training, and in the Guide to Safe Scouting and other documents (available for free online).

So how will you protect yourself and your adult leaders from false accusation, your child from exploitation, and the unit from scandal and humiliation, and yet still give the ever-important adult contact and role-modeling that is so important to our program?

Some items that you should be aware of:

- 1) Recent changes in the **Boy Scout Requirements** (January 2008) include information about bullying and Internet abuse by cyber bullies and others.
- 2) New Youth Protection videos (that supplement the Youth Protection Training available online and through your training teams) are now available on DVD for both adults and youth in all sections (Cubs, Scouts, and Venturing) and will be available for free at Roundtable for all units and interested persons. (VHS versions may also be available upon request). The training team is always available to help you with presentations or to answer questions.
- 3) **Electronic threats** to your child's personal, physical, and mental well-being should be identified and discussed by your unit committee and the adults in your unit. Roundtable and the training team will have information about ways that Scouters, parents, and youth can safely use the Internet, text messaging and other electronic communications that proliferate in our culture.
- 4) Safety in Traveling: Know how and <u>when</u> to properly file a Tour Permit, know what the council has on updates on rules regarding Tour Permits, and upcoming changes in the filing of Tour Permits (there is the possibility of online filing in the future).

Scout Roundtable and the *Up Etowah Creek* Newsletter will also have information on ways that parents can find out if their child is being abused/bullied by others or is abusing others, behavioral tell-tales to watch for, how to track usage of cell phones and Internet site visits, establish security barriers for communication devices (computers, cell phones, PDAs, etc) and more.

What Every Unit Should Be Stressing:

Youth Protection Training is important for <u>all</u> members of the unit, adults and youth alike. Get your unit trained, in person or online. *And if your unit leaders say that you do not need to be trained, they are wrong.* Protect yourself and your children by knowing and enacting the policies and procedures of the BSA.

- ALL youth must be told that one-on-one contact of any sort (in person or electronically) with an adult who is not their parent is not allowed in the BSA, and what they should do if it happens.
- ALL youth need to be encouraged to watch out for each other and be made aware that bullying, hazing, and/or harassment is not tolerated in the BSA, not from adults and not from youth.
- ALL parents must be educated so that they know what the rules are and what to look for: for example, that if a leader brings their child home from a meeting, there must be another child (the leader's son for example) or 2 adults in the car with them
- ALL parents, youth, leaders, and volunteers need to know what to do and who to contact if suspicions are raised.

The BSA Youth Protection Policy is not just to protect the youth; it is also to protect the leaders from unfounded rumors, allegations, or suspicion. Lives, reputations, families, and units have been ruined by innuendo and false accusations. By following the policies, knowing the rules, and understanding reason for them, your unit will be a Safe Haven for your son and the sons of your Scouting friends.

Online Youth Protection Training is available for all levels through the council website at www.indianwaters.org. Create an account and be sure to print off the final page when the training is completed, so that you will get credit through your unit (pack, troop, or crew) for being currently trained.
