

Non-registered Boy means

No Advancement and Un-Insured Do you have Webelos that just crossed over to your troop? If you have not registered them at the Scout office, either as a transfer from a pack or as a new Scout joining your troop, the boy will be ineligible for advancement and is not covered by BSA insurance if they go to

meetings or camping. You May Be Personally Liable!! Many Scoutmasters wait until they re-charter to register the new Scouts. Do not wait. Please check with Felicia at the Scout office to make sure that all gaps in registration are filled in. Boys who are not registered will not be allowed to advance in rank.

Lightning Safety: Are You Prepared?

If you go camping frequently, the chances are good that you'll run into all kinds of weather conditions, whether it is merely a drizzling rain or something much worse. Each year at campouts, camporees, and camps thousands of Scouts will get a first-hand opportunity to experience a thunderstorm. And that means lightning.

While lightning can be fascinating, it can also be deadly. Recently Scouts have been struck by lightning while at Jamboree, and at some summer camps across the US. Thunderstorms and lightning are common in South Carolina.

Are your Scouts prepared? What can you do? What are some of the facts about lightning that you should know about? How can you as a leader of youth be prepared for this danger? Go to

Etowah Creek E-mail Lists Message from Lorie McGraw, Webmaster and E-mail Geek Hello, all,

As most of you know I spend wayyyy too much time on my computer keeping up with Scouting topics and news from across the US and the world. I pass many (not all) of these bits of information on to interested Scouters through my email distribution lists. I am completely redoing the lists. If you want to be on a list, please send an e-mail to me at Imcgraw@sc.rr.com and tell me which list or lists interest you. Anyong from Any District may subscribe

you. Anyone from Any District may subscribe.

I developed these lists so that you would not get e-mails from me that do not interest you. Obviously a Cub Leader will be interested in Bear and Wolf advancement changes, but Eagle Scout advancement changes will not be of interest. So here are my categories, from most inclusive to least. My lists are:

- Etowah News Only: News of high importance to all area Scouters. About 3-6 times per month. All persons who give me their address will be on this list.
- Etowah All: News of general interest to all Scouts and Scouters. Includes local news, Scouts in the news, General Training updates, News from National, local events, Scouting humor etc. Variable 2-20 times per week. Most frequent.
- Etowah Cub Leaders Only: Items that are of interest only to those in the Tiger/Cub Scouts/Webelos programs. Information tailored for Cub-age Scouts and their leaders. Training updates, songs, program info and links, fundraisers, etc. About 6 times per week or less, depending on what information comes in to me about the Cub programs.
- Etowah Scoutmasters Only: Items for Webelos, Boy Scouts, Venture, OA Youth and Adult. Cooking hints, camping and backpacking gear, training opportunities, program info, troop organization, Patrol Method, hiking info, fundraisers, summer camps, skits and songs for older boys, etc. About 6-12 times a week, depending on the information that I get that needs to be passed on.
- Etowah Training (new): E-mail list for Scouters interested in training or who wish to keep abreast of changes in training. This is not in place of the Indian Waters Training List on Yahoo. This is for the trainers that work with Etowah Creek District (though non-district or other district trainers are

welcome). Infrequent.

Possibly in the future I will be switching over to Yahoo Groups for interactive email lists, but for right now these are newsletter-style lists, meaning that I send to you and replies are sent to me only, not to others in the



list. All $\ensuremath{\mathsf{e}}\xspace$ are hidden for privacy and Spam reduction.


