

LET'S THINK BIG

These are just some of the remarks I am hearing from the food pantries.

Is there a need for Scouting for Food this year? YES!!! Lets Beat Last Year's Record!

Last year, only 11 Cub Packs and 8 Boy Scout Troops participated in Scouting for Food, but they collected almost 10,000 pounds of food items. We currently have about 58 Packs and Troops in Etowah, can you imagine the number of families we could feed if most of them helped with the Food Drive? We could easily collect 30 to 50 TONS of food!

Scouting is Helping Others in Need.

This year please consider the importance of helping more of the hungry in our community. Boys who handed out 10 bags last year could increase to 50 bags this year.

LAND RUSH

On Thursday, January 11th, 2001 Etowah will conduct a LAND RUSH for distributing the collecting territories. Units should send a representative to Ashland United Methodist Church at 6:30 PM to stake a claim on the territory that the unit will work. We will initially place each unit within a designated boundary determined by one of the elementary school districts from which they recruit their boys. The representative can select the roads that their unit wishes to work. Unlike last year, attention will be paid to working as many areas as possible and not just around the homes of scouts.

Plastic bags, sample of bag notes, and a list of pantries that will be open on February 10 and maps for getting to these pantries will also be at the Land Rush. Your unit is free to select any pantry for their donation of food but they must make their own arrangement if they choose a pantry not on the list.

YPT to be offered in January

In January we will be offering **Youth Protection Training** (YPT) **for all parents** (not just leaders) before our monthly Roundtable (January 11, 2001 at 6:30 at Ashland).

Youth Protection Training is only 60-90 minutes, or less time than 1 football game or 2 shows of Oprah. If you don't know what BSA policy is, how can you make sure that your den or pack is following it?

Thanks to Youth Protection training and the policies that BSA has enacted, our sons are safer in Scouting than they are in just about any other venue for youth. You will come away with a better understanding on how to protect your scouts, yourself, and your pack. The bottom line is this: The most important way that you can be sure that your den and pack are following current policy, and therefore doing your best to protect your son from abuse and molestation, is to make sure that you and your unit's parents are trained in current Youth Protection.

What will you do if a boy is harmed or an adult accused in your unit????

Get your adults and yourself trained NOW!

Knot Cheat Sheets

There are many awards that are available for Scouts and Scouters that are National or Regional awards and Religious Awards.

Some of these have deadlines of Dec. 31!!!

Please take a moment to look over the descriptions below and ponder as to whether one of the Scouters or youth in your unit deserves to be recognized. Then check with the Council Office to get the proper forms. Some of these are already past deadline.

Editor's Corner

How do you recognize the volunteers that make your unit run? Too many people think its someone else's job to apply for it. Every volunteer should be out there now looking around for someone they can nominate. Heck, they should be looking every day! First, recognize that nobody really wants to come out and say, "I want one of those awards!" We've been trained since childhood to be meek and to not boast or cause personal attention to ourselves. Very few Scouters will come right out and say "I want to be put in this year for the District Award of Merit" or some other award.

So how do you find those "clovers in the grass"? There's not a foolproof way...but think about the following:

- When you have a problem with your unit or with district operation, who do you call? That person deserves a nomination.
- Who helps you with execution of your unit's program? That
 person deserves a nomination.
- Who "sweats Scouting"; that is, who do you know is working so
 hard on Scouting, that you can "see" the Scouting ooze from
 every pore, every other word he or she speaks, and in their
 attitude toward everyone? That person deserves a nomination.
- Who has stuck it out through a hard year of Scouting...ready to give it up one week and the next is on "cloud nine"? That person deserves a nomination.
- Has there been a chartered organization or a business or a
 group of people who have not only assisted but made it easy for
 you to take advantage of their good graces by asking them to help
 out again and again...yeah, sure, you gave them a piece of paper
 or a plaque, but they too need to be nominated for an award.

Second, Do not take it granted that others have seen the same things that you have seen! Nominations are nothing but paper.... it will not do any nominating committee anything but good if they receive two, three, seventeen nominations from people about one or two individuals. As a matter of fact, the additional nominations may "fill in the blanks" between what the first person said and the second, third, etc. So nominate them yourself even if you think, heard, or feel that others will do so, too!

Third, Please be complete when filling out the application. If the award requires the Scout Executive to sign, don't go around him and have a District Executive to sign...make the effort. The same goes for signatures from other officials...church officials, volunteer organizations, etc. Each year many nominations are missed because they were not completely filled out. Ask someone at the Council office to help you out.

Fourth, Make an effort to note the awards that the nominee already has. There are ways to ask what awards he/she has received. And don't forget activity in groups outside of Scouting or other youth programs. The more information, the better the decision of the nominating committee will be.

Fifth, Please do not tell the person(s) that you have nominated them for an award. "I've got something special for you, but I'm not gonna tell you..." Don't do this to those people you've nominated. The award may not be approved for a variety of reasons:

- The person may have already asked the nominating committee not to consider any awards for him or her for several reasons
- The award may be delayed and not presented at the District Banquet in favor of another, more important occasion instead
- A higher or better award may be in the offerings for this person. The BSA asks their volunteers NOT to advise people that they have been nominated for an award until after the date of the award presentation. Don't spoil the surprise.

Do what you can, and let's see if we can recognize the efforts of lots of people who truly make Scouting work.
