### LAND RUSH

On Thursday, January 10<sup>th</sup>, 2002 Etowah will conduct a LAND RUSH for distributing the collecting territories for Scouting For Food. Units should send a representative to Ashland United Methodist Church at 6:15 PM to stake a claim on the territory that the unit will work. We will initially place each unit within a designated boundary determined by one of the elementary school districts from which they recruit their boys. Other areas will be assigned if no one claims them. The representative can select the roads that their unit wishes to work. Attention will be paid to working as many areas as possible and not just around the homes of scouts.

Plastic bags, sample of bag notes, and a list of pantries that will be open on February 9 and maps for getting to these pantries will also be at the Land Rush. Your unit is free to select any pantry for their donation of food but they must make their own arrangement if they choose a pantry not on the list.

# Swimming Merit Badge Requirements Have Changed!

This just in from the National Office:



"The National Boy Scout Advancement Committee recommended changes in the requirements for the Swimming merit badge that were approved by the National Boy Scout Committee on October 16, 2001. These changes become effective on January 1, 2002. Youth have the option of doing the requirements listed in the

Boy Scout Requirements 2001 book or these new requirements.

**The significant changes are:**

First Class requirement 9(c) has been removed from the First Class requirements and is now requirement 4 of the Swimming merit badge.

Requirements 7 and 9 have been combined and are now requirement 8. This requirement will now read as follows:

8. Do ONE of the following:

- a. Snorkeling and scuba diving
  - (1) Demonstrate selection and fit of mask, snorkel, and fins: discuss safety in both pool and open-water snorkeling
  - (2) Demonstrate proper use of mask, snorkel, and fins for underwater search and rescue.
  - (3) Describe the sport of scuba diving or snorkeling, and demonstrate your knowledge of BSA policies and procedures relating to that sport.

**OR**

- b. Demonstrate the following competitive swimming skills:
  - (1) Racing dive from a pool edge or dock edge (no elevated dives from racing platforms or starting blocks)
  - (2) Racing form for 25 yards on one competitive stroke (front crawl, back crawl, breaststroke, or butterfly)
  - (3) Racing turns for the stroke that you chose in 8b(2), OR, if the camp facilities cannot accommodate the racing turn, repeat 8b(2) with an additional stroke.
  - (4) Describe the sport of competitive swimming.

Requirement 11, "Assist with instruction in basic swimming skills...", *has been deleted entirely.*

Please keep these changes in mind as you prepare for the next summer camping season."

## Youth Protection Training to be offered in February

In February we will be offering **Youth Protection Training (YPT) for all parents** (not just leaders) before our monthly Roundtable (Feb. 14 at 6:30 at Ashland).

*"I just don't have the time to attend."*

Youth Protection Training is only 60-90 minutes, or less time than 1 football game or 2 shows of Oprah. *If you don't know what BSA policy is, how can you make sure that your den or pack is following it?* Thanks to Youth Protection training and the policies that BSA has enacted, our sons are safer in Scouting than they are in just about any other venue for youth. You will come away with a better understanding on how to protect your scouts, yourself, and your pack.

The bottom line is this: The most important way that you can be sure that your den and pack are following current policy, and therefore *doing your best* to protect your son, is to make sure that you and your unit's parents are trained in *current* Youth Protection.

For years, those of us serving in your Armed Forces have been enjoying the letters and cards that have been sent to us from around the world. I personally have been touched by many of them.



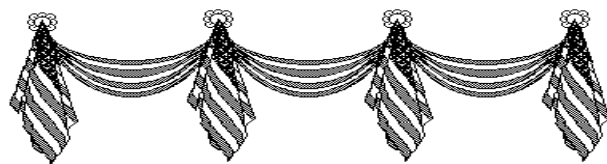
This year I propose that you send a note of thanks, or a word of encouragement to your local police or fire department.
