All BSA Merit Badges Being Revised

BSA is in the process of updating ALL 118 merit badge books, with the goal of updating all of them within 4-5 years (a rate of around 25 per year). As new pamphlets are issued, when they contain new requirements, Scouts will have the option of starting with the new requirements as soon as the pamphlets are issued, or they may start work using the old requirements until the next edition of Boy Scout Requirements is issued. They will NOT be holding the publications up until January each year, just issuing them as they are completed (and old stocks exhausted. Then in January, the Requirements Book will include all revisions to date. There will be NO NEW merit badges approved until that process is complete.

A Reminder: after your unit has turned in the food to the foodbank, please report to Joan Janoch with the following information:


- 1. unit number, who you are, and a unit contact person with a telephone number

Arrow of Light Ceremony WITH PIRE

- 1. Go to magic shop
- 2. Buy flash paper
- 3. Tie flash paper to arrow
- 4. Have candle light for ceremony
- 5. Tell everyone that only a Webelos who truly completed the requirements will have his arrow pass through the flames of the candle without scorching.
- 6. Pass flash paper over the flame. Watch eyelashes.
- 7. Hand off arrow, bring next boy forward.

This works especially well when you buy or fashion those leather arrowheads for the arrows and put the unit number on it. Strap it to the arrow and fit several sheets of flash paper behind it, allowing the flames to really flash high without damaging the arrow.

Boy Scout Leader Basic Training

May 4-6th, 2001 at Camp Barstow

Also known as SM Fundamentals, this training is not just for Scoutmasters. Everyone who is involved with a troop **should take this course.** That includes parents of boys just crossing over, troop committee members, unit commissioners, and anyone who took it more than 5 or 6 years ago. This course will teach you the ins and outs of a Troop, Scouting Skills such as knots, ropework, cooking and camping, plus Patrol games and leadership skills, how to get those boys moving and working together, and how to make them into men. It is fun, informative, and necessary for a safe and full scouting experience.

Insist that the adults that are influencing your boys are recently trained (within the past 5 years). My son's Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmasters
