Thanks to Youth Protection training and the policies that BSA has enacted, our sons are safer in Scouting than they are in just about any other venue

The bottom line is this: The most important way that you can be sure that your den, pack, troop, crew is following current policy, and therefore doing your best to protect your son, is to make sure that you and your unit's parents are trained in current Youth Protection. Youth Protection is also now required on all Tour Permits. Take care of it today! And if your unit leader says that only one person in your unit needs the training, then you need to call Joan. ALL parents and leaders should be trained in current Youth Protection **procedures.** If you are not sure, then you need to be trained.

News from National BSA Headquarters:

BSA will Require Background Checks for New Leaders

(as reported in AP/UP) Boy Scouts will be requiring background checks of new adult volunteers. Those who do not get clearance won't be allowed to join.

Membership will be prohibited if the background check turns up convictions for sex crimes, crimes of violence, or drug offenses.

The requirements will take effect in April.

FEE INCREASE FOR 2003

Beginning January 1, 2003 the Boy Scouts of America will increase its membership registration fee from \$7 to \$10 per year. The increase will affect both youth and adults registering with packs, troops, teams, crews and ships.

PURPOSE OF THE BSA-NOW

The Boy Scouts of America was incorporated to provide a program for community organizations that offers effective character, citizenship, and personal fitness training for youth.

Specifically, the BSA endeavors to develop American citizens who are physically, mentally, and emotionally fit; have a high degree of self-reliance as evidenced in such qualities as initiative, courage, and resourcefulness; have personal values based on religious concepts; have the desire and skills to help others; understand the principles of the American social, economic, and governmental systems; are knowledgeable about and take pride in their American heritage and understand our nation's role in the world; have a keen respect for the basic rights of all people; and are prepared to participate in and give leadership to American society.

Please Cover Your Entire Territory for Scouting For Food



Sticky Buns

Here is a recipe for a Dutch Oven beginner:

- 18 frozen dinner rolls (the smallest size)
- 1 small regular (the kind you cook) butterscotch pudding mix
- 6 Tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon

SCOUTERS' CORNER Too Fast For Conditions

Ok, I have an analogy for everyone.... If the "Guide To Safe Scouting" is like the black on white speed limit signs, then the "Age-Appropriate Guidelines for Scouting Activities" (Bin #18-260) is like the black on yellow "safe speed" sign that is associated with the upcoming curve. While a State Patrol officer probably won't stop you for taking a corner faster than the posted safe speed, you can bet that if you wreck on that corner you will probably get a "Driving Too Fast For Conditions" ticket. Additionally, just because you were driving exactly the posted safe speed on corner that's covered with ice doesn't mean that you are out of the dog house...

On page 6 of the current *Scouting* magazine there is an article about the Age-Appropriate Guidelines. It says "the guidelines are not intended as strict rules...". Unfortunately, many Scouters seem to take this to mean "it's just something the BSA threw together... I don't have to follow it if I don't want to... heck, it's just a guideline". And just like the yellow speed signs, this is true... up to a point! This document is a "suggested safe speed" for most Scouting activities (don't forget to take special conditions into account) and remember that not following it has the potential for it being used against you!

The article goes on to say that if you choose to go outside the guidelines you "should consider the readiness level of each individual scout". This tells me that simply choosing not to follow the guideline is not an advised thing to do... If you are supposed to evaluate on an individual basis, it doesn't sound like a blanket "this isn't really important" stance on any item is a particularly good idea. So keep this in mind when you choose to exceed the guidelines.... while there is nothing keeping you from doing it, it might be a good idea to think about the fact that National spent the time to come up with those guidelines for a reason.
