Columbia's Annual Native American Cultural Festival is coming. This event is fun for all, featuring all day dancing, drumming, arts, crafts, and Native American foods.



Easy camp out meals

http://www.nay.org/dutch_o.htm. Any pizza recipe will work fine. Just spread the dough in an oiled oven, rolling the edges up the side a bit. Spread pizza or spaghetti sauce (you can buy it in squirt bottles which work very well on campouts). Sprinkle with desired toppings and cheese (precook and drain bacon and sausage).

Place most of the heat on top, about 15 briquettes on top of a 12" oven and 8 underneath. Like most

Dutch oven cooking, peeking is allowed, even encouraged. The pizza is done when the crust is golden brown and the cheese is melted.

You can also make individual-sized pizzas with the rolls you buy in the refrigerator case. Roll out each biscuit to about 6" in diameter, then apply sauce and toppings. You can get 2 or three in one 12" oven.

Dutch Oven Parmesan Potatoes

Preheat Dutch Oven.

Wash well about 5 pounds of small red potatoes, about the same size. Do not peel. Cut in half and set aside. Melt one-half stick (2 ounces) of butter in the oven. Cover bottom of Dutch oven with Parmesan cheese, around 1/16" thick.

Put potatoes in bottom, cut side down. Split coals 75% on top, 25% underneath. Cook for about 20 minutes, until potatoes are soft. You want the cheese to form a brown crust, but not burn. The crust should stick to the potatoes when you take them out.

Breakfast Recipe

Eggs McSanchez in a Ziploc Bag

2 eggs

Bacon bits or crumbled bacon Onion flakes Flour tortillas 1 slice cheese or shredded cheese Salsa sauce 1-quart Ziploc <u>freezer</u> bag

In the freezer bag place the eggs - minus the shells.


Add the bacon, salsa, and onion. Add

water or milk - 1/8 cup or 2 TBS. Zip up tight removing most of the air, and mix the eggs and ingredients by fingering vigorously. Scramble in the bag.

Place the bag in a boiling pot of water and cook until done. Remove from the pot. (If no leaks use the water for hot chocolate or cleanup.) Scoop the eggs on the flour tortillas and add some cheese, fold and eat. Makes fillings for about 2 tortillas.

Cooking time is not too critical since the bags are sealed. So the scouts have time to clean out their tents and pack up while waiting. Moist ingredients take longer to cook, (open bag and let some of the moisture out, return to pot). Do not use the slide-lock bags, as they will leak. Use Freezer bags only and a large enough pot that the bags cannot touch the edge of the hot metal pot.

** Free Airplane rides (~30 minutes long in private planes) over Columbia through the Young Eagles program


** Obstacle course manned by a large contingent of Marines. All kids that go through it successfully (and the Marines will make sure that all are successful) get a set of dogtage

If a unit covered 100 houses last year, cover 600 or a 1000 this year. It is not necessary for a boy to live in a neighborhood for the Scout unit to collect food from that neighborhood community. Cub dens and Scout patrols conceivably could cover all of Columbia and the surrounding areas. Last year many large neighborhoods were not able to help because no unit put out bags or collected bags from them.

Listen for the number of food drives that are conducted in November and December and then factor in empty pantry shelves by February and you may begin to understand the real need in our community which IS NOT BEING MET BY ANY

Commissioner's Corner

Report Card on the Ethics of American Youth.

I got this report recently and I thought that it was interesting. The Josephson Institute For Ethics released the preliminary findings of its survey, entitled "Report Card on the Ethics of American Youth." The results of this survey point to what the institute calls "shocking levels of moral illiteracy" among American kids.

- They report that ninety-two percent of kids surveyed admitted to lying to their parents, and seventy-eight percent admitted lying to a teacher. (A Scout is Trustworthy)
- Seventy percent said that they had cheated on a test, and half of them said that they had done so more than once. One quarter of those surveyed said that they would lie to get a job. (A Scout is Trustworthy)
- And one in six said that they had gone to school while drunk -- not hung over, mind you, but drunk -- at least once in the previous year. (Physically strong, mentally awake, morally straight)

An editorial in the Atlanta Constitution summarized the findings as follows: "America's next generation [believes that] it's perfectly acceptable to lie and cheat at home and in the world." This is true despite the fact that three quarters of all the states now mandate that students be taught about "values" like honesty, trustworthiness, respect for others, and the like.

We need Scouting More Than Ever! Ask a boy to join Scouting today! It is not too late!
